Black History Month Programs

Black History Month has its origins in 1926 with the legendary historian Carter G. Woodson. As a founding member of the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, now the Association for the Study of African American Life and History, Woodson pushed for the second week of February to be Negro History Week. The week coincides with the birthdays of the abolitionist Frederick Douglass and President Abraham Lincoln. Durham has played and continues to play an important role in Black History. Negro Durham Marches On: An Examination of the Past and Future of Hayti in Durham Saturday, February 22, 3 - 4:30 p.m. **Main Library Registration Required**

Join Durham County Library's North Carolina Collection for a special screening of the historic 1948 film <u>Negro Durham Marches On</u> by Don Parisher. The film was commissioned by the Durham Business and Professional Chain, and it depicts many of the thriving businesses, organizations, and residential homes in Durham's Hayti community before they were lost to the construction of the Durham Freeway in the 1970s. In 2021, the library received funding from the National Film Preservation Foundation to restore and preserve the film for the future. After viewing the film, we will have a panel discussion on the history of the film itself, the grant project to preserve it, and its role in preserving the history of Hayti. We will also hear from community leaders and stakeholders who will discuss Hayti's more recent history in the community and share a vision for its future in an ever-changing and growing Durham.
