Twenty Years A-Growing

<u>Written by Maurice O'Sullivan</u> E-Audiobook

Originally published in Irish Gaelic as *Fiche Blian ag Fás*, Muiris Ó Súilleabháin's (anglicized as Maurice O'Sullivan) *Twenty Years A-Growing* is a memoir of the author's life and the culture he was part of on the Great Blasket Island. An Irish-speaking archipelago off the west coast of Ireland, the Blasket Islands were inhabited by fishing communities until the islands were abandoned in 1954 due to population decline. *Twenty Years A-Growing* is a riveting example of an oral tradition recorded in writing, and as a result makes a fantastic e-audiobook.

<u>The Wind That Shakes the Barley</u> Directed by Ken Loach DVD

Loosely based on the story of Tom Barry's Flying Column in West County Cork, Ken Loach's *The Wind That Shakes the Barley* tells the story of two brothers during the Irish War of Independence. The Irish War of Independence lasted from 1919-1921 and was characterized by a guerilla campaign by the Irish against the British Empire's notorious Black and Tans, a force of traumatized WWI veterans known for their brutality. Featuring a young Cillian Murphy – later of *Peaky Blinders* fame - *The Wind That Shakes the Barley* encapsulates the historical and cultural tensions that underwrote the conflict.
