**Tressie McMillan Cottom** Monday, April 7, 6:30 - 7:30 p.m. **Main Library Registration Required** 

As a UNC-Chapel Hill professor, sociologist, and public intellectual, Dr. Tressie McMillan Cottom has revolutionized the way many Americans think about higher education. Her 2017 work Lower Ed: The Troubling Rise of For-Profit Colleges in the New Economy, led to appearances in multiple national media outlets. Her second book, *Thick: And Other Essays*, was a finalist for the 2019 National Book Award, and shortly thereafter Dr. Cottom received a MacArthur Foundation Fellowship. Join Dr. Cottom at Main Library to kick off our fifth annual Library Fest!

#### Dr. Zelda Lockhart Thursday, April 10, 4 - 6 p.m. Offsite at the Nasher Museum of Art **Registration Required**

Dr. Zelda Lockhart's work focuses on the power of nature to connect us across barriers and heal our generations. Her works include her novels <u>Trinity</u>, <u>Fifth Born II</u>, and <u>Cold Running Creek</u> in addition to a collection of essays on writing titled <u>The Soul of the Full-</u> <u>Length Manuscript</u>. For this Library Fest event, Dr. Lockhart will share the unanswered family questions that led to her genealogy research for Trinity and Cold Running Creek while leading attendees in an interactive experience.

David Menconi is an author, critic, and journalist based in Raleigh who served as the 2019 Piedmont Laureate. 
